General Information & Status Updates

- A. Basketball Court Closure at Mack Park – Beginning Sept. 11, the basketball courts at Mack Park will be closed for repairs. Over the past year, staff have monitored ongoing settling issues, and recent dry weather paired with extreme heat has accelerated foundation movement, creating uneven surfaces along one side of the courts and at the base of the hoops. The courts will remain closed while repair needs are fully assessed and completed. We appreciate the community’s patience as we work to maintain safe recreation spaces. - B. Opportunity Zone 2.0 Nomination – The Opportunity Zone Program, created under the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017, is a federal economic stimulus tool designed to spur investment in distressed communities. The new Opportunity Zone 2.0 Program was established under the One Big Beautiful Bill Act of 2025. Three Census tracts (208, 211, and 212.03) submitted by Economic Development, Community Development, Development Services and the City Manager’s Office in June, have been selected by Governor Greg Abbott for nomination as Opportunity Zones under the 2.0 program. The Census tracts were shared with City Council in an informal staff report on June 26.

Texas has 2,420 eligible census tracts, of which 25% can be designated under the 2.0 Program. The Governor's Office submitted 605 Census tracts from 105 counties to the U.S. Treasury Department, following review by the Texas Economic Development and Tourism Office based on eligibility, statutory compliance, local support, project viability, and geographic balance. Of the 25 eligible tracts in Denton County, seven were selected for nomination, including all three tracts submitted by the City.

Opportunity Zones provide a capital gains tax deferral for qualifying investments in designated zones. The federal tax benefit can be combined with other funding sources and mechanisms, such as an economic development incentive or development districts to make projects viable. - C. Denton Manufacturing and Career Day – The Office of Economic Development is partnering with Denton ISD, Denton Chamber of Commerce, Goodwill North Central Texas, North Central Texas College, Texas Veterans Commission, United Way of Denton County, and Workforce Solutions for North Central Texas to host a Manufacturing Career Day and Job Fair on Thursday, Sept. 24, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. at the Quakertown Civic Center located at 321 E. McKinney St, Denton, TX.

This event will incorporate elements of the nationwide [Manufacturing Day](#) initiative while also continuing the City's established Denton Community Job Fair programming. During the morning session, Denton ISD 8th grade students will engage directly with local manufacturers to learn about industry operations and opportunities in the community. Participating employers will provide interactive displays highlighting their products and processes. The afternoon session will consist of the Denton Community Job Fair from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., featuring the same employers recruiting specifically for manufacturing positions. This portion of the event is free and open to the public.

Businesses in Denton County that are accepting applications for current job openings can participate by registering at www.DentonJobFair.com. Space is limited to 50 employers. The Denton Community Job Fair is free for qualified businesses and open to all job seekers. Job seekers need to register in advance of the event. This year's spring job fair offered more than 1,300 job openings by 45 Denton employers and saw about 475 job seekers attend. - D. MLK Jr. Rec Center Closure – The MLK Jr. Recreation Center (1300 Wilson St.) is temporarily closed for updates and repairs starting Monday, Sept. 14. and anticipated to reopen on Monday, Sept. 28. These improvements reflect the City's commitment to providing safe, high-quality facilities for all residents, members, and visitors. All active membership passes will remain valid throughout the closure. Members are welcome to use their passes at any open recreation center during regular operating hours. - E. Inclement Weather Shelter – From Sept. 3 through Sept. 9, the Inclement Weather Shelter at the Denton Community Shelter (909 N. Loop 288) was opened seven times. The inclement weather shelter is opened in accordance with the City’s [Use of Facilities for Inclement Weather Policy](#) to provide overnight cooling for individuals when there is a Major or Extreme HeatRisk. The below table details the shelter’s utilization and capacity through this period and **Attachment A** is the Denton County Public Health Heat-Related Illness Surveillance Report for the week of Aug. 30 through Sept. 5. Although standard capacity during inclement weather is 195 beds, Our Daily Bread further expands capacity at the shelter when the need arises. Responses to Council Member Requests for Information

- A. Intersection Road Safety Audit – On Aug. 17, Council member Rumohr shared an inquiry from a resident about safety concerns at the intersection of W Oak Street and N Texas Boulevard, including traffic in the right travel lane cutting across the other travel lane to enter the left-turn lane. Transportation staff audited the location for safety concerns. Based on audit findings, All-Way Stop Control will be installed so all vehicle movement can safely enter and exit the intersection and will relocate the existing stop sign for better visibility from W Oak Street. Implementation of these changes is planned in the next 2-3 weeks. Staff contact: Chandra Muruganandham, Transportation Services

- B. Traffic Signal Request – On Aug. 15, Mayor Pro Tem Stevens shared a request from a resident on the process to add a traffic signal at the intersection of University Drive (US 380) and Redwood Place citing safety concerns. Transportation staff audited the location for safety concerns. An upcoming Capital Improvement Project (CIP) for US 380 lighting should improve nighttime visibility, and staff will coordinate with the Parks Department to clear low level vegetation along University Drive to the east to improve sight visibility of oncoming westbound vehicles and expect this clearing to be completed in 3 to 4 weeks. Redwood Place currently has stop signs, and based on historical crash data in the vicinity of the intersection, this location will be added to the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) for TxDOT to consider a traffic signal installation and recommend building sidewalks along the south side of University Drive. - C. South Lakes Tennis/Pickleball Court Improvements – On Sept. 5, Mayor Watts shared a request from a resident regarding lighting, court spacing, and usage standards for Pickleball courts at South Lakes Park. Parks staff are tracking all feedback related to the courts and understand how popular they are and how much the community values them. The request for additional lighting has been logged as a future budget request for appropriate evaluation. Staff are reviewing the option of additional striping on the courts, though there are logistical challenges with placing nets on casters and the placement of the permanent tennis nets that are currently in place that are being worked through.

Within the next month, courtesy signage will be installed outlining court etiquette and introducing a queuing system to create a clearer, more organized process for play. Staff contact: Jen Basham, Parks & Recreation

Figure 1. Daily Temperatures and Heat-Related Illnesses in Denton County, April 26, 2026 – Present[‡]

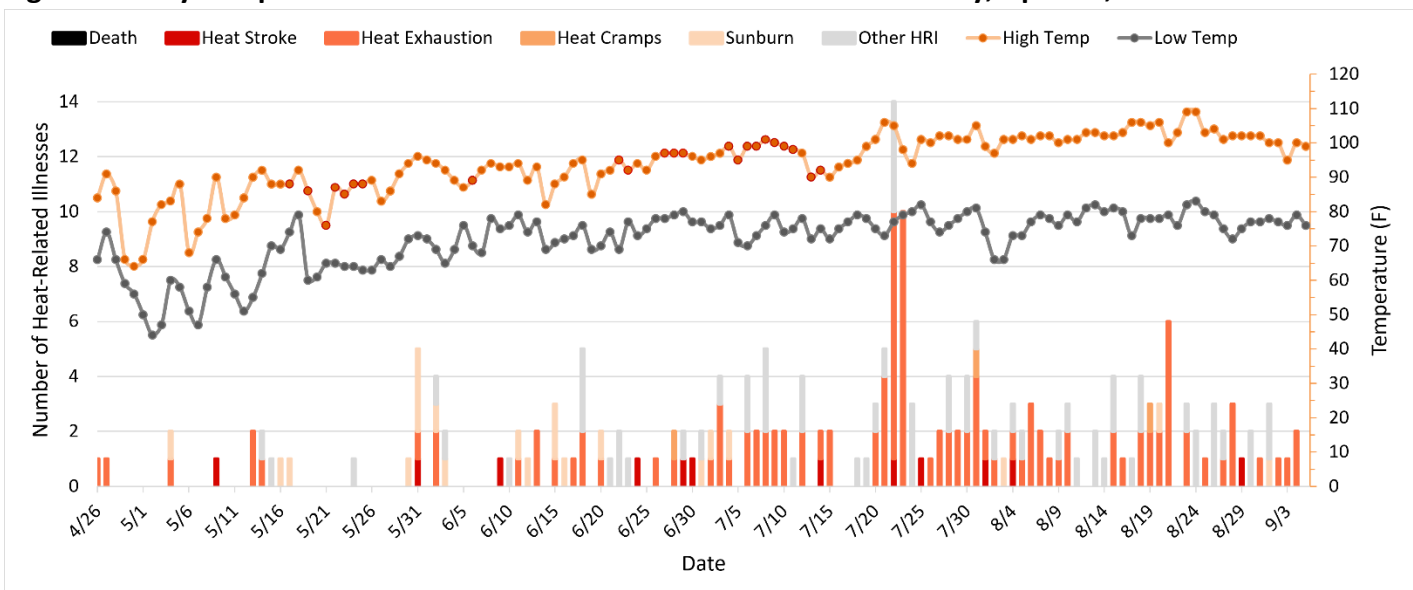
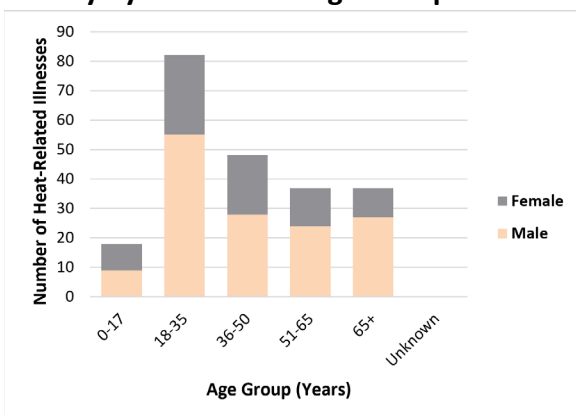


Figure 2. Heat-Related Illnesses in Denton County by Gender and Age Group

INFORMAL STAFF REPORT TO MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL

SUBJECT:

Bond Oversight Committee feedback regarding extending the 2023 Bond Program and co-locating the Active Adult Center and South Branch Library.

SUMMARY:

This report is intended to provide feedback from the Bond Oversight Committee pertaining to proposed changes to the 2023 bond program presented to City Council. The Bond Oversight Committee serves to ensure efficiency, timeliness, and accountability in the implementation of the City's voter approved bond programs. This includes monitoring the City's plans relating to the issuance of bonds. During the budget process in July, the City Council directed staff to evaluate the 2023 bond program for two purposes:

1. The potential savings associated with a co-located library & active adult center.
2. Extending the bond program to reduce the annual tax rate impact.

Staff presented options to the City Council on August 8th during the budget workshop. The Bond Oversight Committee convened a Special Called Meeting on Aug. 20 to receive a report and provide feedback regarding the proposals in alignment with the committee's charge to monitor the issuance of the 2023 program bonds. Members attending were Brandon McCleskey, Nanci Kimmey, Brand Richter, and Randy Robinson; absent members included Tim Crouch, Tamsyn Price, and Janet Shelton. Staff provided the Bond Oversight Committee with an update on the 2023 bond projects, an overview of the projected tax rates, and the extended bond program timeline to smooth tax rate impacts.

Committee feedback included:

Extension of bond program: Three members opposed extending the program, citing concerns about cost escalation, project delivery history, and honoring voter expectations for timely delivery. One member was in favor.

Co-locating the Active Adult Center and South Branch Library: All members supported exploring the option as a cost-saving measure but emphasized it should be a last resort. They requested concept plans to better visualize impacts. Concerns included relocating the Senior Center away from the population it serves and potential community expectations that it would remain on its existing site.

Overall, the committee emphasized maintaining the current timeline, managing potential cost escalation, and ensuring decisions align with community expectations.

CONCLUSION:

As directed by City Council during the budget workshop, staff have reduced the FY 2026-27 bond program issuance to \$5.8 million in the proposed budget, with the expectation to revisit the bond issuance timeline and colocation of the active adult center and library during the upcoming fiscal year.

INFORMAL STAFF REPORT TO MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL

SUBJECT:

Evaluating community input on revenue generation and budget allocation.

SUMMARY:

This City launched a budget feedback survey on Aug. 10 and ran for 30 days through Sept. 9.

BACKGROUND:

The purpose of this survey was to gauge residents' support for methods of raising future revenue, and where they would like that increased funding to be spent. These findings can be used to aid in ensuring future budget decisions are made in line with residents' interests. This is a continuation of research from prior years' budget simulator/surveys.

DISCUSSION:

General Budget Feedback

The overall feedback on the City's budget approach is positive. Opinions on the overall value for tax dollars followed a positive skew, with the consensus opinion that respondents' 'Overall Value for Tax Dollars' was in the middle somewhere between average and good. Only a single respondent rated their value as 'Very Poor' (compared to 29 for 'Good' and 8 for 'Excellent'). With regards to revenue, a comfortable majority (72%) would support the City exploring efforts to increase revenue *if* it meant increased funding to their preferred community priorities. Of those, 35% would be supportive in a property tax increase, 52% would be supportive of an increase in user fees, and 17% support some other means of revenue generation.

Community Priorities

Respondents were given 100 points to assign across 11 community priorities according to how they would like the distribution of additional revenue to be spent. Of the options provided, the top three highest rated priorities were:

1. Utility Infrastructure (15.9)
2. Maintenance of Streets and Sidewalks (14.5)
3. Public Safety Services (13.3)

The three lowest rated priorities were:

1. Code Enforcement (4.3)
2. Engage/Inform Residents about Key Issues (4.8)
3. Economic Development Efforts (5.3)

Some of the priorities ended up with high levels of variance in the data, meaning while the ranking may be in the middle or even high, there was a sizable amount of disagreement on both ends of support. The three highest variance priorities were:

1. Public Safety Services ($\pm$ 13.3)
2. Utility Infrastructure ($\pm$ 10.3)
3. Issues Related to Homelessness ($\pm$ 9.2)

Dataset Challenges

Following the trend from last year, participation in this year's budget survey is continuing to increase year over year. There were 81 complete responses and 18 partial responses, marking a 35% increase in complete responses from 2025.

Despite the trend, the sample remains small relative to the City's population, making it hard to forecast specifics of public opinion beyond general trends. The make-up of the respondents was not representative of the City's overall population. The 18-29 cohort is under-represented in this data (by about 30%), and simultaneously the 30-49 and 70+ cohorts are both over-represented (by 33% and 20%, respectively). When it comes to location, the biggest discrepancies are 76205 (under-represented by 41%), 76208 (under-represented by 76%), and 76207 (over-represented by 90%). As a result of this reality, the results from this survey should be taken in the context of the make-up of respondents. Low participation from 18-30 residents is in line with the participation rates from prior surveys within the City.

Cohort Variance

Each age-range had individual priorities with variance from the overall mean. This is useful to highlight preferred priorities specific to individual cohorts and can be helpful to consider the effects of our unrepresentative sample, with respect to age. Keep in mind this is not the top three priorities for each cohort, but rather the degree to which each cohort rated something higher than the overall average across cohorts.

18-29 Preferred Priorities

1. Environmental Sustainability (+ 2.3)
2. Issues Related to Homelessness (+ 2.2)
3. Community Amenities (+ 1.7)

30-49 Preferred Priorities

1. Environmental Sustainability (+ 1.8)
2. Issues Related to Homelessness (+ 1.7)
3. Community Amenities (+ 1.0)

50-69 Preferred Priorities

1. Public Safety Services (+ 7.7)
2. Utility Infrastructure (+ 7.4)
3. Maintenance of Streets & Sidewalks (+ 3.4)

70+ Preferred Priorities

1. Design & Layout of Denton (+ 2.7)
2. Public Safety Services (+ 2.6)
3. Economic Development Efforts (+ 1.6)

Conclusion

Based on the 2026 Budget Survey results, residents continue to show growing engagement and constructive interest in shaping the City's fiscal direction. While the sample remains limited and not fully representative of the broader community, the findings provide useful insight into general preferences around future revenue generation and priority areas for investment. Respondents expressed overall satisfaction with the value of their tax dollars and showed strong willingness to support revenue increases when tied to their community priorities. Infrastructure, public safety, and maintenance remain core areas of focus, while cohort-specific variations highlight the diverse needs and values across age groups. These

results, taken in context with demographic limitations, offer valuable guidance to inform future budget decisions and ensure they align more closely with the interests and expectations of residents.

NEXT STEPS:

As part of the upcoming budget public hearing on Sept. 15, Council may take these survey results as supplemental feedback to help inform final budget deliberations.

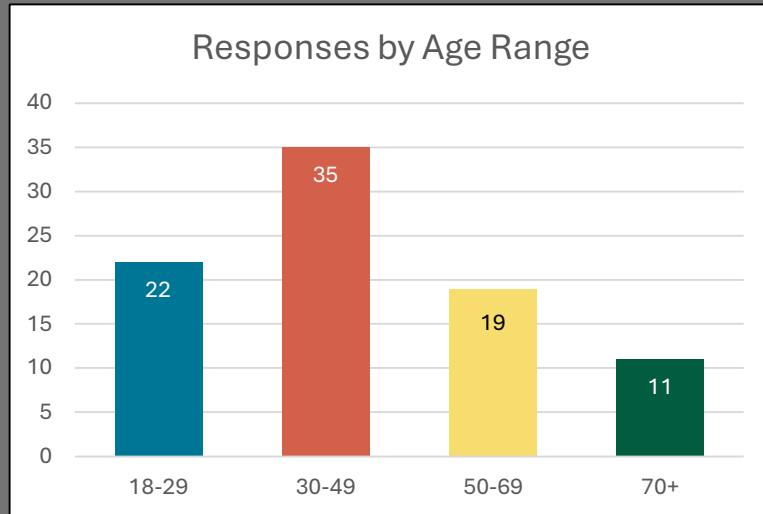

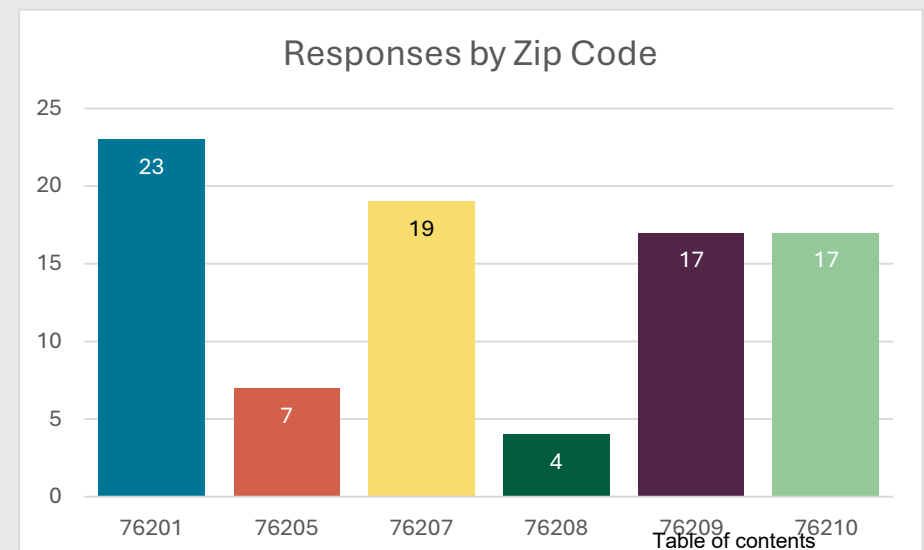
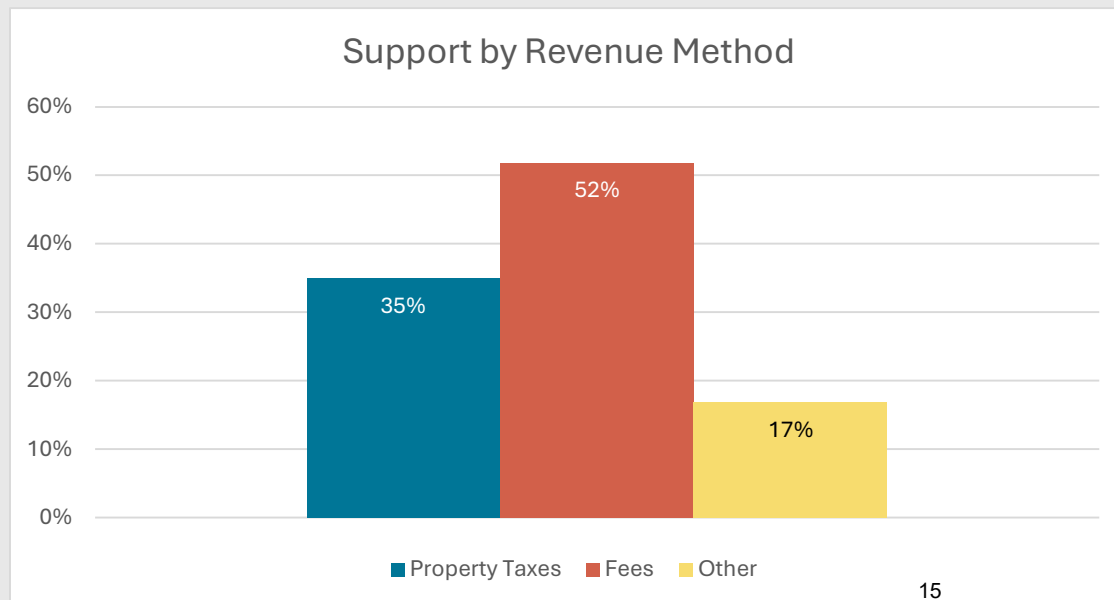
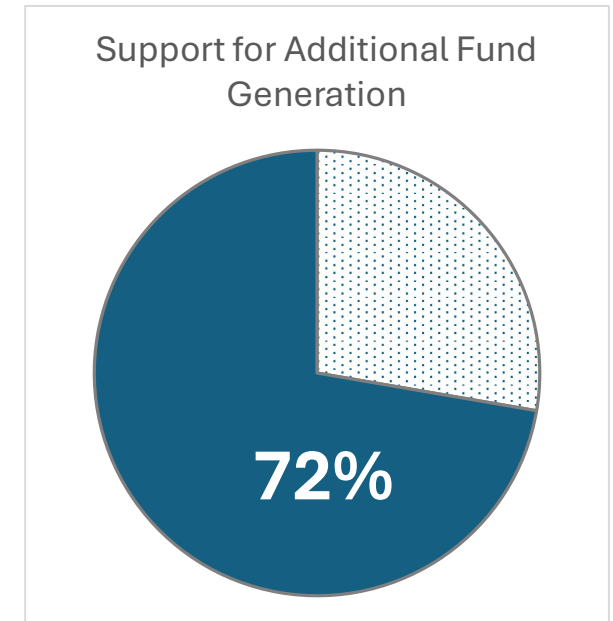
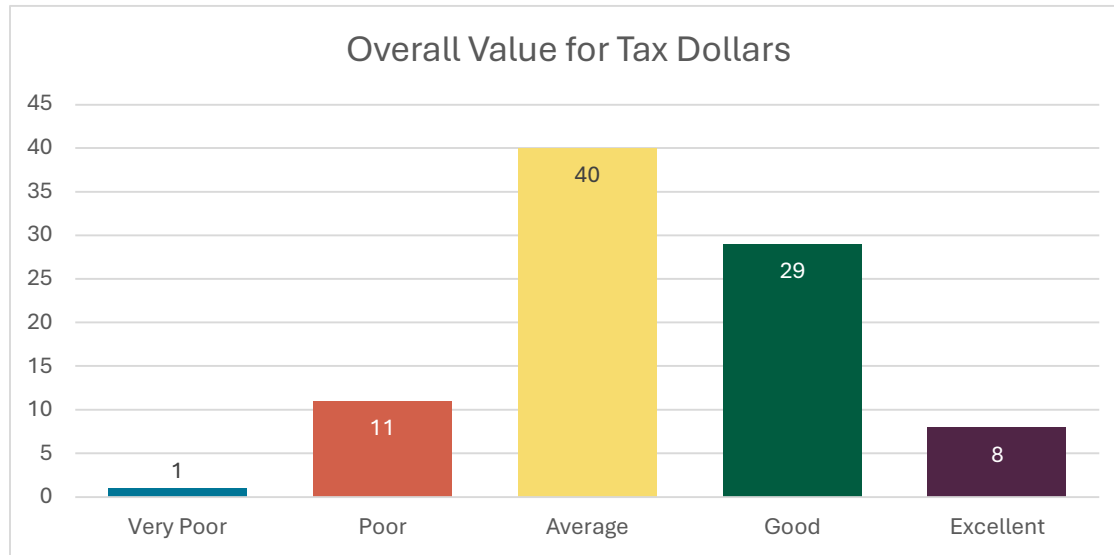

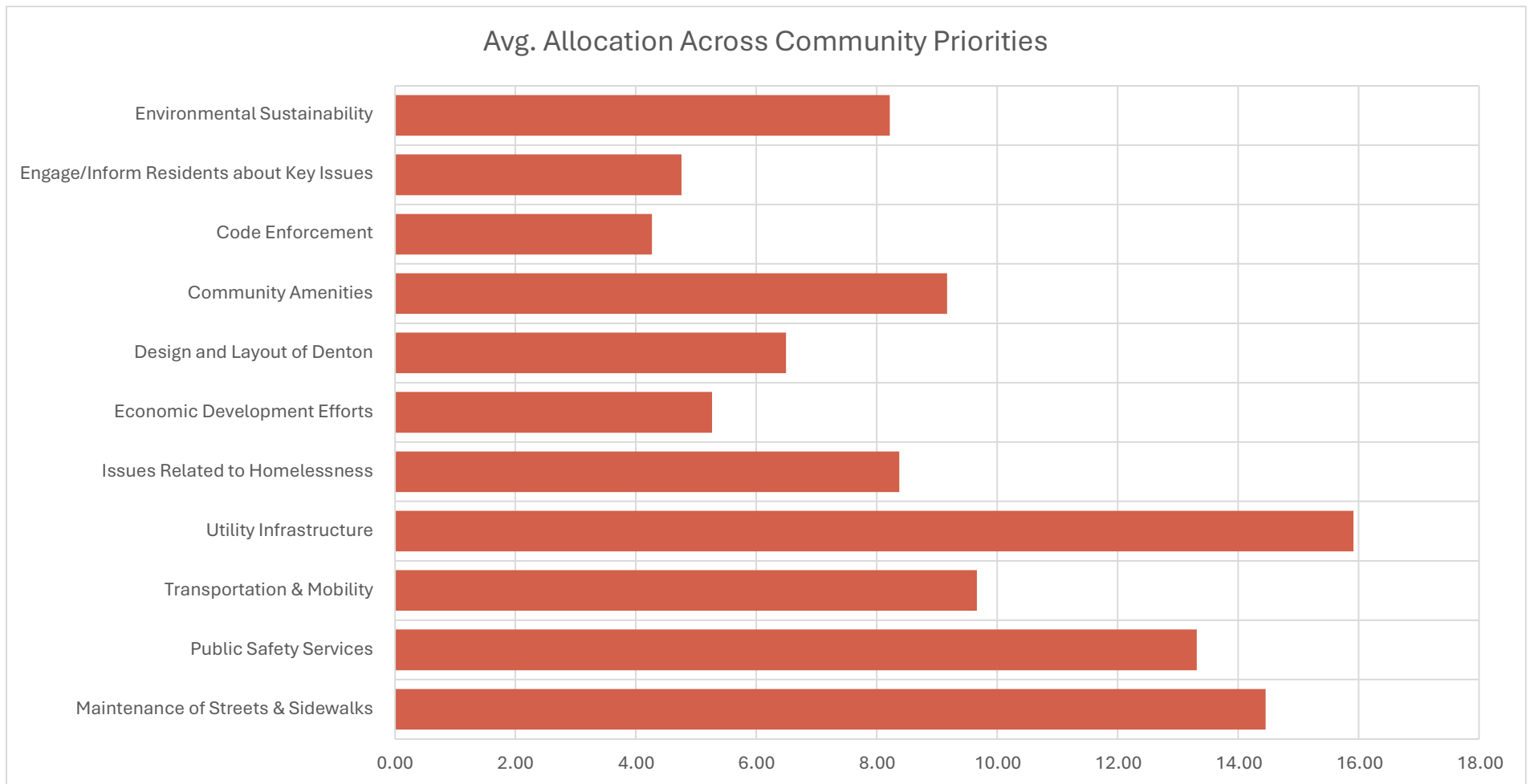
Among those who support the city pursuing opportunities for increased revenue, about half were supportive of an increase in User Fees to fund their community priorities.

Budget Allocation

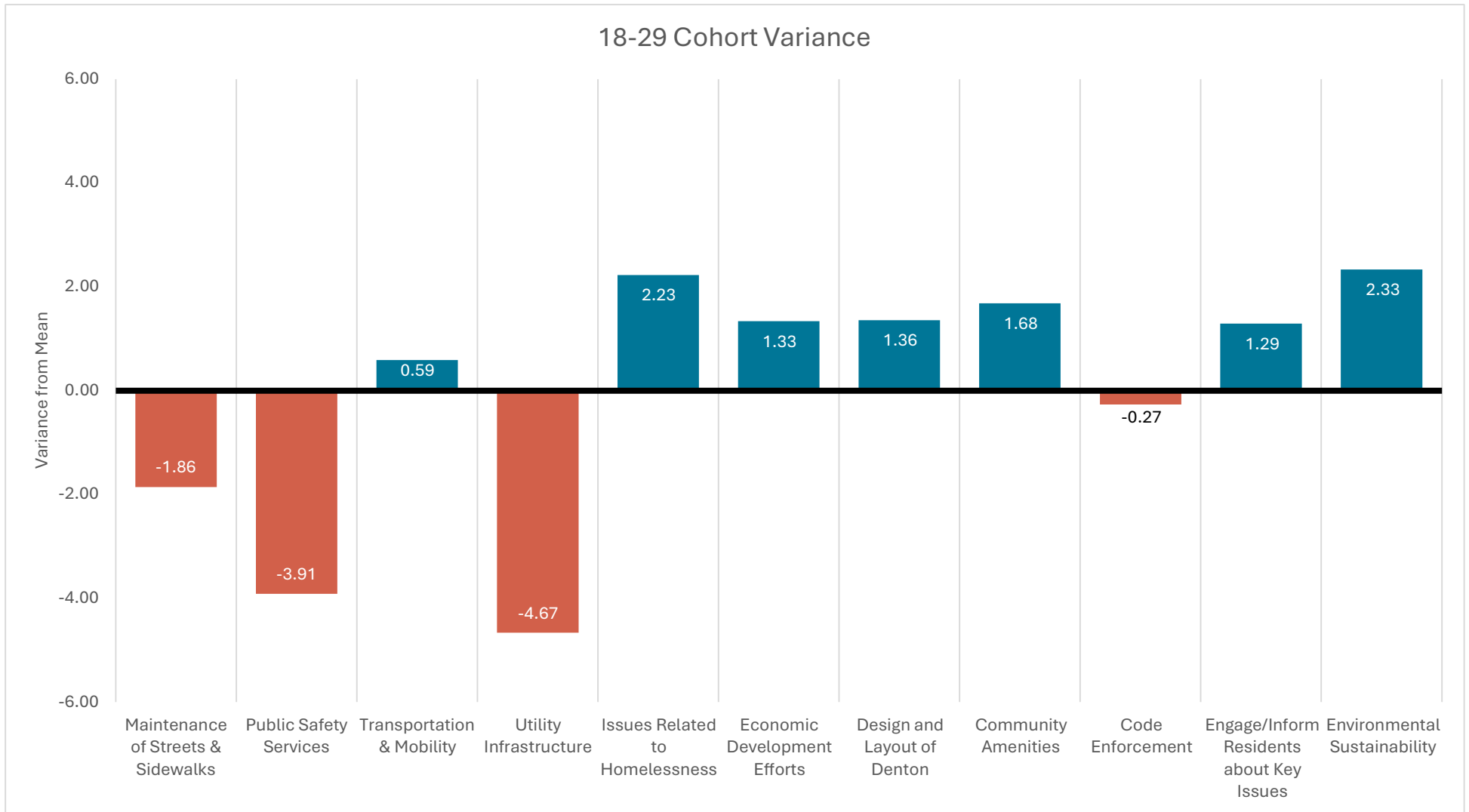
Respondents were asked to distribute 100 points across 11 Community Priorities according to their preferences for future investment.

Top 3 Categories: 1. Utility Infrastructure, 2. Maintenance of Streets & Sidewalks, 3. Public Safety Services

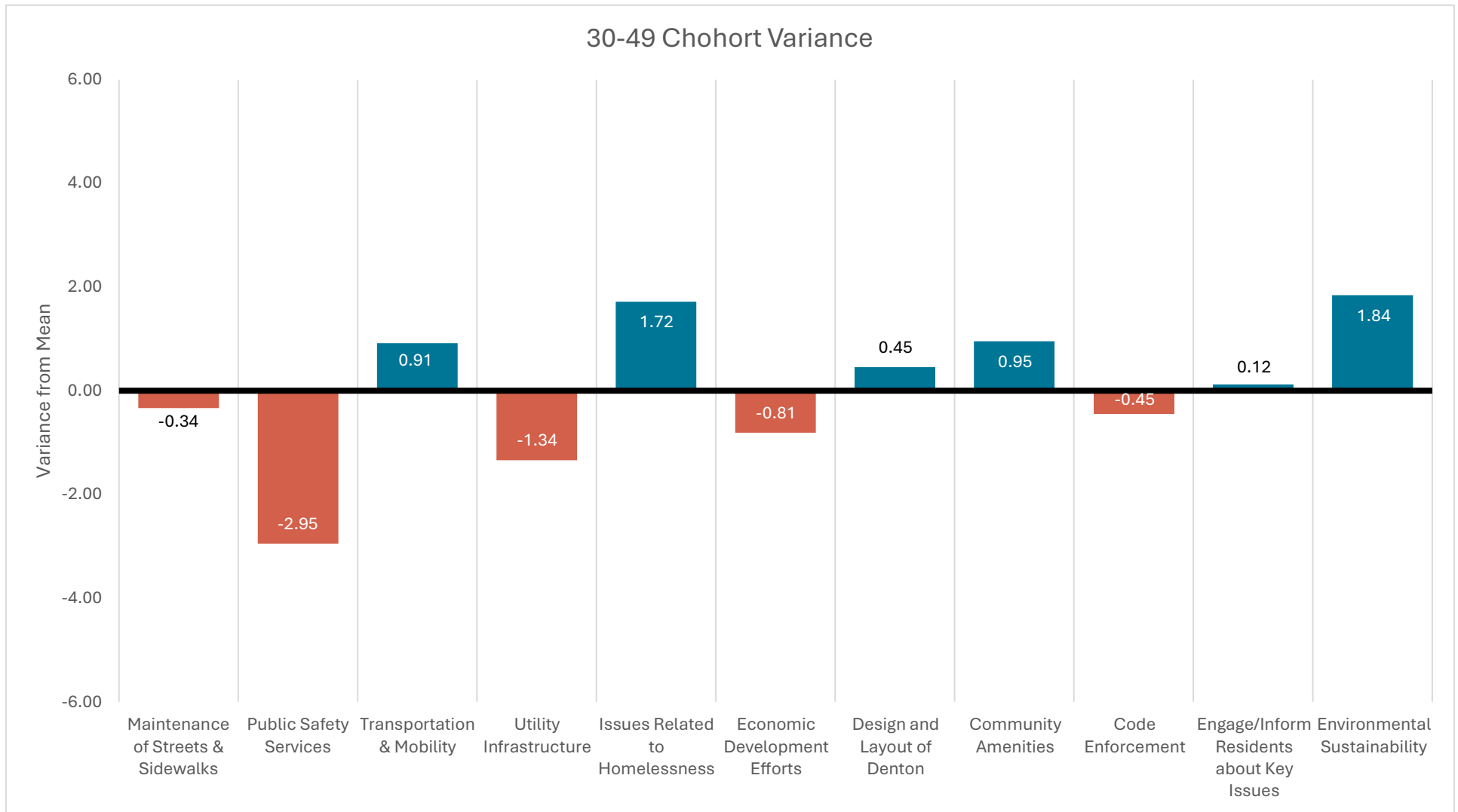
Cohort Variance (18-29)

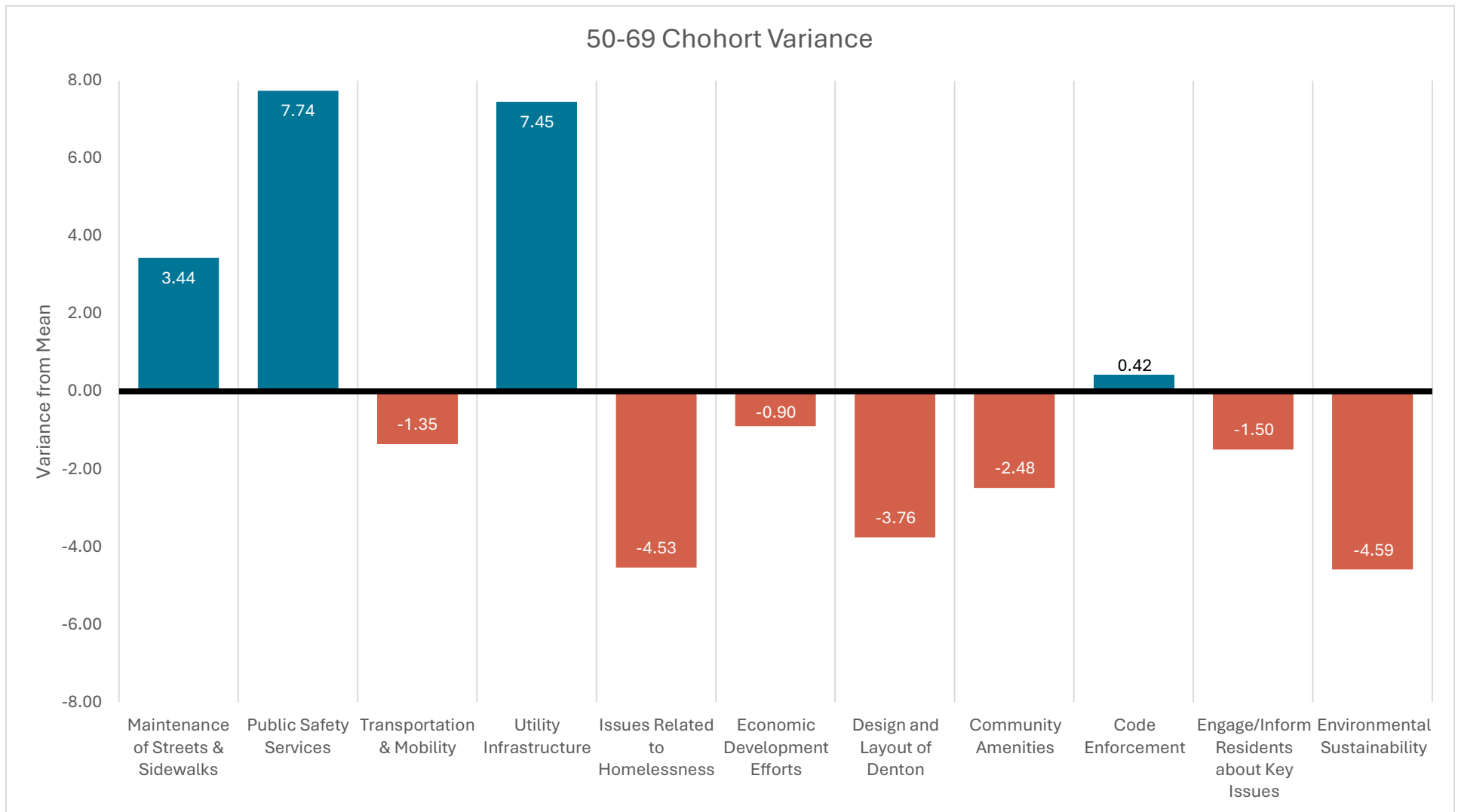
Cohort Variance (30-49)

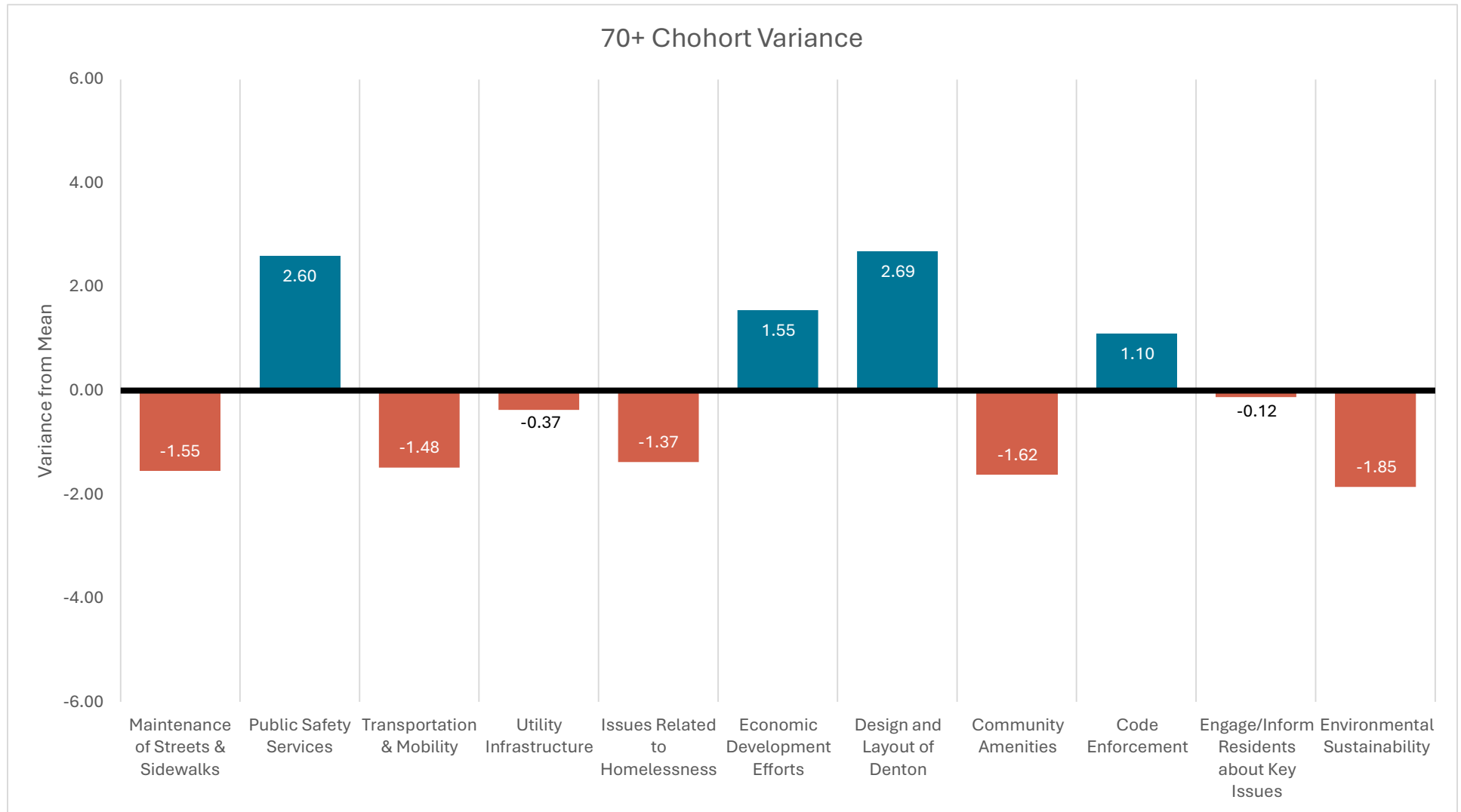
Cohort Variance 50-69

I was very surprised to hear that the Denton Community Market had gotten \$60k in the past. That's a lot of money and seems to sustain a service that the community isn't interested in supporting enough. What other areas of the budget are supporting things like this? Also, water (and likely other utilities) - the city buildings (or maybe county) seem to use utilities far more than residential homes - we are encouraged to save but do the city buildings do the same? Utilities are a significant portion of my monthly budget so I assume city buildings are the same. I would support just about anything that can be done to slow down or stop the construction of apartments. On the surface they seem like a good idea. But rent really isn't much more (if at all) than a house payment. It's the tax and insurance that drives the price up. What if we could help support people trying to buy houses. Home ownership is helpful in so many ways to a community. Could we help with the taxes or insurance for people who have a lower income or similar? If we could get them out of the endless process of paying rent, we'd be investing in the community instead of big apartment complexes owned by who knows who. Thanks!
As a Denton resident and homeowner, my primary request is to exercise fiscal responsibility and restrain from increasing property taxes. With rising cost across the board, the city should prioritize the essentials â€” maintaining streets, public safety and keeping our municipal utilities infrastructure reliable” within our current budget. Additionally, taxpayer dollars, municipal incentives and public utility capacity should not be factored into electricity and water intensive data centers. Our local budget and shared utility resources should serve current residence in neighborhoods first, and not high impact industrial operations that strain our electricity and water utilities.
Our current system is untenable because we have deferred maintenance for so long that residents expect our current taxes and land use can pay for the infrastructure we enjoy when that is simply not true. The sooner the city understands and explains this to people, the sooner we can have a productive conversation about what future sustainable model for Denton our residents want. Otherwise every budget year is just a kid in a candy store with no long term guide or focus.
What is our process for pursuing state/ federal grants that could be considered? Are we applying for enough? What is our percentage achieved vs applied? Should we focus our efforts on qualifying for more grants?

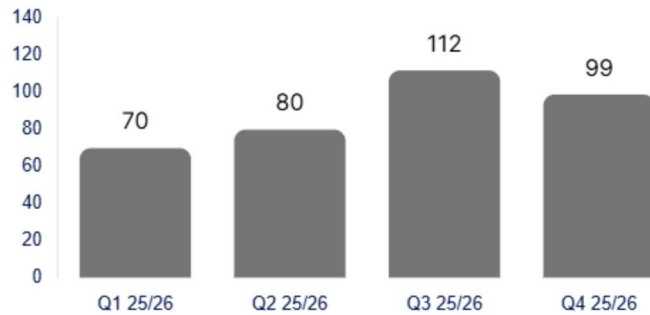
MORE BUS STOPS! I live in North Denton and the closest bus stop to me is a 50+ minute walk. Inaccessible!

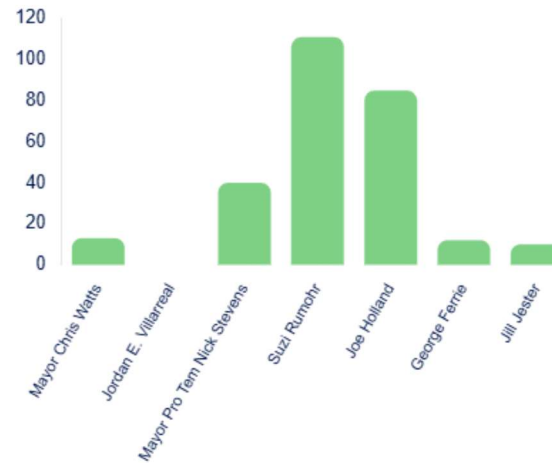

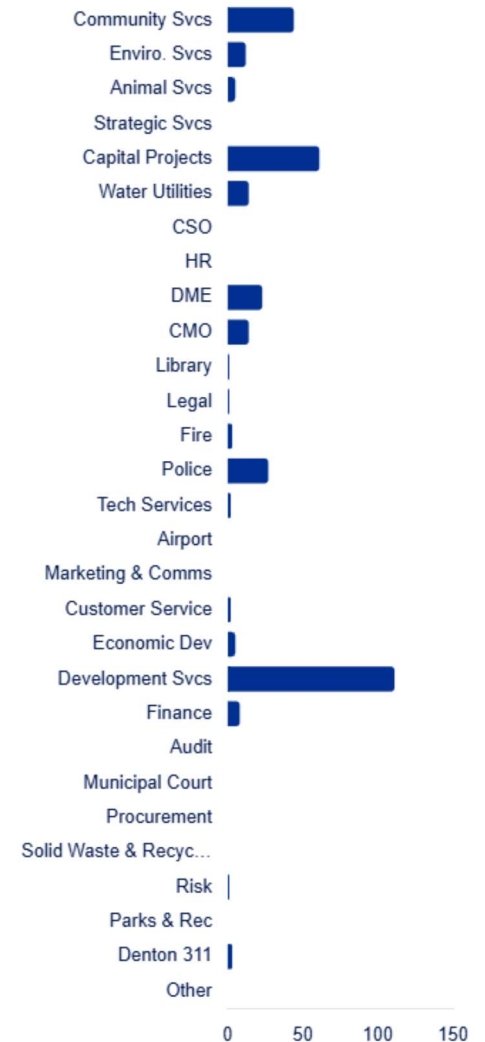
Number of Requests Per Quarter

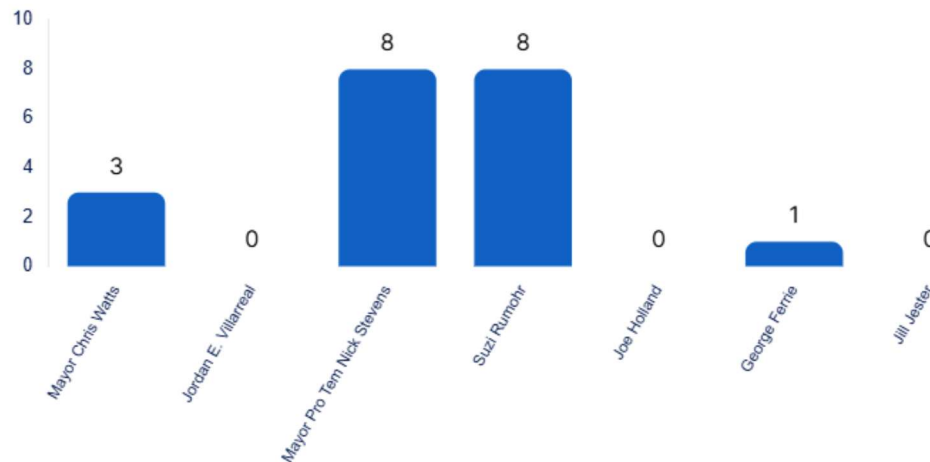
